The Church Ordinances: Baptism and Communion (Part 2 of 2)

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The English dictionary defines an ordinance as simply "a law or rule which was made by one in authority". In this case and study, our authority is the Founder and Builder of the Church, Jesus Christ.

In our study today, we are going to mainly focus on the second ordinance that Christ left for the church. And might I add, He only left the church two ordinances.

But first, let's look at why baptism and Communion are ordinances and foot washing is not.

Ordinance #1: Baptism

FIRST: Baptism is an ordinance because in Mat 28, Jesus <u>commanded</u> the disciples to go into all nations and baptize converts.

<u>Go</u> ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them... (Mat 28:19)

Second: In Romans 6, the Word of God teaches us that baptism is symbolic (a picture) of the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ.



Know ye not, that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus Christ were baptized into his death? Therefore we are buried with Him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. (Rom 6:3-4)

So we see, baptism is first of all a command from Christ, and second, it is a very personal, as well as an outward act in which <u>each</u> and <u>every</u> believer is buried and raised (with Christ) in newness of life.

Third: The early church <u>continued to practice</u> BAPTISM, just like Christ had commanded them to.

Then they that gladly received his word were baptized: (Acts 2:41)

But when they believed Philip preaching the things concerning the kingdom of God, and the name of Jesus Christ, they were baptized, both men and women. (Acts 8:12)

Ordinance #2: Communion

FIRST: Christ made it very clear that we (the church) are to break bread and drink of the cup as a remembrance of Him.



After the same manner also He [Jesus] took the cup, when he had supped, saying, This

cup is the New Testament in my blood: this do ye, as oft as ye drink it, <u>in re-</u> membrance of me. **(1 Cor 11:25)**

Second: And again, Christ very clearly states that the church is to continue the eating of the bread and drinking of the cup *until He comes back*.

For as often as ye eat this bread, and drink this cup, ye do shew the Lord's death <u>till He come</u>. (1 Cor 11:26)

And just like the first ordinance, the taking of the bread and cup is a very personal and outward act, in which <u>each</u> and <u>every</u> believer identifies with his/her Savior.

Third: The early church continued to practice COMMUNION, just like Christ had commanded them to. See 1st Corinthians 11:17-34.

Foot Washing

Before we get into our study on commun-



ion, please allow me to address foot washing and why that particular act of ministry is not considered by all churches to be an ordinance of Christ. However, foot washing is one of the greatest acts of service

and humility that anyone could ever show

each other. For instance, think about the fact that Jesus Christ washed the feet of men, even one who was hours away from betraying Him as a murderer.


Even though He was King of kings and Lord of lords; and even though He had come from God, He knew and lived in all the splendor and glory of heaven, and yet the Bible tells us that He laid His clothing aside and began to wash the feet of men.

But unlike baptism and communion, Jesus doesn't tell the disciples "do this in remembrance of me" or "do this until I come back". Neither does it symbolize in the same ways that baptism and communion do. It was simply an act of servant-hood and humility that Jesus practiced, right before His death on the cross. Therefore, not all church bodies consider foot washing an ordinance that was given out by Christ.

But as stated at the very beginning, we are going to study the ordinance of communion today. It is important that we understand that the Communion Service is called by 1:3 and compare 1 Cor. 1:9).

1. COMMUNION—this name is found in 1 Corinthians 10:16



This word means "fellowship, participa-

tion, the sharing of a common life." COM-MUNION is not something that just the Bishop and Elders and Deacons share in, but it is something that all the believers share in and participate in. The Bible says...

...for we are ALL partakers of that one bread. (1 Cor 10:17b)

It is our privilege to enjoy FELLOWSHIP with our risen Lord and with one another (1 John

different names. Here are the different 2. THE LORD'S TABLE—this name is found in 1 Corinthians 10:21

"ye cannot be partakers of the LORD'S **TABLE**, and of the table of devils. (1 Cor

It was at a table that the Lord Jesus first instituted Communion. It was at a table that the Lord first broke the bread and passed the cup. A "table" reminds us of FELLOWSHIP (compare Revelation 3:20)

Behold, I stand at the door, and knock: if any man hear My voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with HIM, and he with ME. (Rev 3:20)

Those who sit at the same table partake together of the same food. All believers partake of the same Savior. All believers are trusting His shed blood. All believers are sharing His life.

3. THE LORD'S SUPPER—this name is found in 1 Corinthians 11:20

On the night before He was crucified, Jesus

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shared in a SUPPER MEAL with His disciples. After this **SUPPER** Jesus instituted the bread and the cup. See Luke 22:20

Likewise also the cup AFTER SUPPER, saying, This cup is the new testament in my blood, which is shed for you. (Luke 22:20)

4. THE EUCHARIST—this is a Greek word which means "giving of thanks"

Before breaking the bread and passing the cup, Jesus **GAVE THANKS** to God.

And He took bread, and GAVE THANKS, and brake it, and gave unto them... (Luke 22:19)

And He took the cup, and GAVE THANKS, and gave it to them... (Matthew 26:27)

The Communion service ought to be a special time when believers thank God for what Christ has done for them.

5. THE BREAKING OF BREAD

This is what Jesus did (Matthew 26:26) and this is what the followers of Jesus continued to do in Acts chapter 2.

And they continued stedfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and in BREAKING OF BREAD, and in prayers. (Acts 2:42)

COMMUNION: INSTITUTED BY CHRIST

The Communion service was instituted (established) on the same night the Lord



Jesus was betraved. day Jesus would go to the cross, suffer and shed His blood for us. We read about what Jesus did on this night in the

(Matthew 26:26-30; Mark 14:22-26; Luke 22:19-20 and 1 Corinthians 11:23-25)

Notice the (underlined) commands that we find in 1 Corinthians 11:24-25:

And when he had given thanks, he brake it, and said, **TAKE**, eat: this is my body, which is broken for you: this **<u>DO</u>** in remembrance of me. After the same manner also he took the cup, when he had supped, saying, This cup is the new

testament in my blood: this **DO** ye, as oft as ye drink it, in remembrance of me. (1 Cor 11:23-25)

The reason we observe Communion is because Jesus Christ has told us to! Jesus said it and the Church must obey it!

WHAT DOES COMMUNION PICTURE?

Just like Baptism, Communion presents a very important picture.

1. The bread is a symbol (a picture) of Jesus' body...

And as they were eating, Jesus took bread, and blessed it, and brake it, and gave it to the disciples, and said, Take, eat; this is my body. (Matthew 26:26)

2. The cup is a symbol (a picture) of Jesus' blood...

And he took the cup, and gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, Drink ye all of it; For this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins. (Mat 26:27-28)

What did Jesus mean when He said, "THIS IS MY BODY" and "THIS IS MY BLOOD"? There are churches today that believe that the communion bread actually changes and becomes the body of Christ. They believe also that the wine actually changes and becomes the blood of Jesus.

Suppose a man has a picture or a photograph of his wife. One day he shows it to a On the very next friend and says, "Look, this is my wife." What does he mean? Obviously he does not mean that this small piece of photographic paper is actually his wife. He is merely using a common figure of speech called a metaphor. What he really means is: "This represents my wife. This is a picture of my wife. When you look at this picture you will think of my wife."

> This is exactly what Jesus meant. Jesus said, "THIS IS MY BODY" and the meaning of these words is: "This bread represents My body. This bread is a picture (symbol) of My body. When you look at this bread you will think of My body and what I did for you when I died on the cross." What did Jesus

mean when He said "THIS IS MY BLOOD"?

A TIME TO REMEMBER

The Lord Jesus has told us why we should observe Communion. He has told us why



we should eat the bread and drink the cup. He said...

"This do in REMEM-BERENCE of Me" (1 Corinthians 11:24 and 25)

God knows that people

are apt to forget. We tend to forget even important things! But there is one thing that God never wants us to forget. He never wants us to forget what our Savior did for us on the cross:

- 1. HIS BODY WAS OFFERED AS A SACRI-FICE FOR SIN: (See 1 Peter 2:24; 3:18; 2 Corinthians 5:21)
- 2. HIS BLOOD WAS SHED SO THAT OUR SINS COULD BE FORGIVEN: (See Matthew 26:28; Ephesians 1:7; Revelation 1:5)

For over 2,000 years, the communion service has been a time when the church stops and thinks back to the cross and remembers what Jesus did for us when He died in our place.


WHO SHOULD PARTAKE OF COMMUNION?

In Acts 2:41-46 we learn that "all that BE-LIEVED were together" (verse 44) and it was these people who were "breaking bread" (verses 42 and 46).

Before you take Communion you should make sure of these four things:

(1)

Make sure you are saved. Make sure that



vou are a believer in Jesus Christ and that you are trusting Him and what He did on the cross for your eternal salvation.

(2) Make sure

know that you are saved. Many people do not have assurance of salvation. They may think they are saved or hope they are saved or feel like they are saved, but God wants us to "KNOW" that we have eternal life (1 John 5:13).

These things have I written unto you that believe on the name of the Son of God; that ye may know that ye have eternal life... (1 John 5:13)

(3)

Make sure you examine yourself and are



ready to eat and drink in a worthy manner (1 Corinthians 11:27-31). Parents sometimes have a rule for their children that goes something like this: "You can't eat supper without washing your

hands!" So also the believer must not eat at the Lord's Table without clean hands. Sin and the Savior cannot come together. A holy God cannot have fellowship with an unclean believer (compare John 13:8; 1 John 1:5-9).

Before partaking of Communion the believer needs to realize this: "Apart from Christ I am dirty and I have no access to God. I cannot come to God as I am. Sin and the Savior cannot come together. I thank God that I have a Savior who makes me clean. I thank God that the blood of Jesus Christ keeps on cleansing me from all sin (1 John 1:7).

The only way that I can approach God is through Christ and through His cross. I need to come to God this way (through the cross) and this is the only way that I can come. Thank you Lord for making me clean. Thank you that I am able to have fellowship with a holy God. Thank you for what Jesus did for me on the cross to make this possible."

(4)

Make sure that you are ready to take Communion in the right way. Communion is a serious time. It is a time to think about our Savior and what He has done for us. It is a thoughtful and a thankful time. It is not a play time. It is not a time to "have a snack." It is not a time to play with the bread with your fingers. It is not a time to take a huge swallow of wine. Those who do such things are showing that they are definitely not ready to take communion.

HOW OFTEN SHOULD COMMUNION BE OBSERVED?

The Lord Jesus did not say how often believers should observe Communion. He said it should be done "OFTEN" (1 Corinthians 11:25-26) but He did not say how often. Some churches have Communion every week. Some have it every month. Some have it every other month and others have it twice a year.

There are two dangers that churches need to avoid:

DANGER #1 Having Communion Too Often

If Communion is observed too often, then it is possible that the service could lose some of its meaning. The Communion service should be as meaningful as possible. When something is done too often it can become a ritual (doing something out of habit without really understanding what you are doing or why). The Communion service should always be something very special and very meaningful. If we do observe Communion often, then we need to make sure that we make every effort to keep before our minds and hearts the significance of what we are doing, remembering our great God and Savior.

DANGER #2 Not Having Communion Often Enough.

If Communion is not observed often enough, then we lose the blessing of it. Also we are not obeying our Lord who told us to remember His death and to do it often (1 Corinthians 11:25-26). We don't want to neglect our duty to remember our Lord as He commanded.

THE FOUR "LOOKS" OF COMMUNION

A BACKWARD LOOK—looking back to the cross to see and to remember what the Lord Jesus has done for me by the offering up of His body and the shedding of His precious blood (1 Peter 1:18-19; 2:24; 3:18; 2 Corinthians 5:21; Ephesians 1:7; Matthew 26:28).



AN UPWARD LOOK—looking unto Jesus who is presently doing a work for me as my Intercessor (Hebrews 7:25; Romans 8:34) and Advocate (1 John 2:1-2), having sat down at the right hand of the Father (Hebrews 1:3; 8:1).

A FORWARD LOOK—looking for Jesus (Titus 2:13) and expecting and waiting (1 Corinthians 1:7-8) for what He will do as He comes again to complete the great work of salvation which He began in me (Philippians 1:6; 3:20-21). Paul said that when believers partake of Communion they are showing (proclaiming) the Lord's death till He COME (1 Corinthians 11:26). Thus Communion looks back to the cross and looks ahead to His coming again.

AN INWARD LOOK—looking at what Jesus is doing in me (1 Cor. 11:27-32; Phil. 2:13).



If I happened to show up on your door step crying, would you care?

If I called you and asked you to pick me up because something happened, would you come?

If I had one day left, to live my life; would you be part of that last day?

If I needed a shoulder to cry on, would you give me yours?

Do you know what the relationship is between your two eyes?

They blink together, they move together, they cry together, they see things together and they sleep together.

The believer must "EXAMINE HIMSELF" (1 Corinthians 11:28). This means that I must put myself to the test. I must put myself on trial. I must examine myself to make sure my heart is right with the Lord. I must recognize that "in me dwelleth no good thing" (Romans 7:18) but I also must recognize that I have a great Savior who makes me clean (1 John 1:7,9)!

The believer must also "JUDGE HIM-SELF" (1 Corinthians 11:31). This means that I must judge myself thoroughly. I must confess any known sins and also acknowledge that I am GUILTY before a holy God. I must also confess that my Savior died for me and paid the penalty for ALL my sin.

I cannot shake hands with God (as it were)

apart from Christ, but through Christ (and because of His cross) I can have access to God and I can enjoy fellowship with God.

If a person fails to "examine himself" and if a person fails to "judge himself" and if a person fails to come to God through the cross, then this person is partaking of the Lord's table in an unworthy manner (1 Corinthians

11:27). He is missing out on the blessing and the meaning and the fellowship of the Communion service and God may need to chasten him ("spank him", a reference to the Father's loving discipline) -see 1 Corinthians 11:30-32.

The next time you take Communion you can think about these four "looks":

- 1) A BACKWARD LOOK--"Thank You Lord for what You did for me on the cross."
- 2) AN UPWARD LOOK--"Thank You Lord that You are my Savior and my Lord and my Helper and my Keeper right now."
- 3) A FORWARD LOOK--"Thank You Lordthat you are coming again, perhaps even today."
- 4) AN INWARD LOOK--"Thank You Lord that if I confess my sins You are faithful and just to forgive my sins and cleanse me from all unrighteousness" (See 1 John 1:9).

But as many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God... (John 1:12-13)

He that <u>hath the Son</u> hath life; *and* he that hath not the Son of God hath not life. (1 John 5:12)

No Perfect Church

It is related that a man once came Charles to Spurgeon, and asked that great preacher if his church was a pure church. He said

he was looking а pure church that he might belong to it.

Mr. Spurgeon said that he did not know about his own church; but he did know that

there were many good people in it—saintly people and truly Christian people.

But there might possibly be a Judas among them, as there was in the company of Jesus' first apostles. And there might be some deceivers and idolators and those

who walk unruly, as there seemed to have been in the churches of Rome, Corinth, Galatia, Ephesus, Colossae, Philippi, Thessalonica, and

all the others to which the New Testament epistles were written.

On the whole, he thought that his church was not the one his brother was looking for. In-

stead, he did not know that there had been such a church in all history.

"But," said Mr. Spurgeon, "if you should happen to find such a church, I beg of you not to join it, for you would spoil the whole thing."

The Time is Nearing, Are You Ready?

Matthew 25:1-13



Then shall the kingdom of heaven be likened unto ten virgins, which took their lamps, and went forth to meet the bridegroom. And five of them were wise, and five of them were foolish. Them that were foolish took their lamps, and took no oil with them, but the wise took oil in their vessels with their lamps.

While the bridegroom tarried, they all slumbered and slept. And at midnight there was a cry made. Behold the bridegroom cometh: go ye out to meet him.

Then all those virgins arose, and trimmed their lamps. And the foolish said unto the wise, Give us of your oil; for our lamps are gone out. But the wise answered saying, Not so; lest there be not enough for us and you: But go ye rather to them that sell, and buy for yourselves.

And while they went to buy, the bridegroom came; and they that were ready went in with him to the marriage: And the door was shut. Afterward came also the other virgins, saying, Lord, Lord, open to us. But He answered and said, Verily I say unto you, I know you not.

Watch therefore; for ye know neither the day nor the hour wherein the Son of man cometh.

This story, I believe, gives us the clear instructions about being ready for the return of Jesus. Anyone who is diligent enough to be aware of what is happening around the world today will know the time is very close for the return of Jesus. These Virgins all believed in Jesus and were waiting for His return. Some of them were too lazy to do what they needed to do to be prepared to meet Jesus. The others spent time preparing and when the time came they were ready to go with Him, while those who weren't prepared were left behind. When they came back and knocked on the door the reply was, "I don't know you".

Many believe Jesus is coming back for His bride, the church, but only some are willing to do what is necessary to be ready for when He comes.

I believe being prepared to meet Jesus is having a relationship with Him now, so He won't have to say to us "I don't know you".

To have a relationship with Jesus, you have to spend time with Him in prayer, reading God's word, and listening to Him as He speaks to your heart. You have to love God with all your heart, mind, soul, and strength, and your neighbor as yourself.

Remember, God hates sin but He gave His only Son Jesus as a sacrifice for the sinner. Judge not, that you might not be judged and remember God will judge you with the same judgment with which you judge others. We have no right to judge anyone. We are all to work out our own salvation.

Amazing Facts In The Bible

The "long day" of Joshua 10:12-14 is one of several miracles in the book of Joshua. The "long day" was a day that is unique in human history.

"And there was no day like that before it or after it, that the LORD hearkened unto the voice of a man: for the LORD fought for Israel" (Joshua 10:14).



The emphasis of the passage is that the great victory that Joshua and Israel achieved that day was because of the prayer of Joshua and the power of God. The book of Joshua describes the conquest of the promised land by the Israelites. The battle of Joshua 10 came as the result of a pact

made between the Israelites and the Gibeonites. As Israel came to aid the Gibeonites who were under attack by the Amorites, Joshua sought the Lord's aid. God rained down huge hailstones on the Amorites, so that the Bible says, "they were more which died with hailstones than they whom the children of Israel slew with the sword" (Joshua 10:11).

After the miraculous intervention of God, Joshua "said in the sight of Israel, <u>Sun, stand thou still</u> upon Gibeon; <u>and thou, Moon, in the valley of Ajalon</u>" (Joshua 10:12).

So the sun stood still, and the moon stayed, until the people had avenged themselves upon their enemies. Is not this written in the book of Jasher? So the sun stood still in the midst of heaven, and hasted not to go down about a whole day" (Joshua 10:13).

(The book of Jasher, an ancient book that is lost and unknown to us, has never been considered a book of inspired scripture.)

Scientifically speaking, this miracle, as is true with all miracles, is difficult to explain. The nature of miracles is such that they are outside the normal course of things, and as acts of God are to be accepted whether or not they can be "explained."

The problem with this particular miracle is that if the rotation of the earth stopped, it would not just have an effect at this battlefield, but would have devastating consequences for the whole earth.

David said, "The earth is the LORD'S, and the fulness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein" (Psalm 24:1). Since God created the world, He certainly would have it within His ability to either stop or slow the rotation

of the earth in such a gradual way that Joshua's "long day" might have been forty-eight hours rather than the normal twenty-four. The text does not demand a sudden "standing still" of the sun.

Other explanations of how God might have caused a long day include a miraculous tilting of the earth on its axis, or a miraculous refraction, or bending of the sun's rays so that daylight continued for many hours beyond a normal day. (The normal tilting of the earth's axis today produces twenty-four periods of sunlight near the north pole.)

But in the end, why try to explain away a miracle? What do we prove? Certainly not that we're smarter than God! Either we believe in a God who can do anything, or we must accept a Christian faith that's non-miraculous; and that does away with the inspiration of the Bible, the Virgin Birth, and the bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ. Certainly there's room for honest guestions about the nature of this miraculous act; but for the humble Christian believer, there's never room for questioning the reality of the miraculous.

When I say, I am a Christian...

Who Is My Neighbor?—By Eli Stutzman

well known of all parables. To many it is known as the parable of the Good Samaritan.

In order to fully understand the impact on the listeners, we shall look in depth a little more. An expert in the Jewish law started the question of 'who is my neighbor'. Let's listen in beginning at Luke chapter 10 verse 25;

"And, behold, a certain lawyer stood up, and tempted him, saying, Master, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?"

Lawyers were an essential part of life in that time and culture. The laws of Moses needed constant explaining.

Then Jesus did what so often was his method; ask another question.

(Luke 10;26-29)

The following parable is probably the most Now we begin to get to the bottom of the whole parable, which is the important guestion; Who is my neighbor?

> Simply put, to most of us, it is the person living nearby. If we have good neighbors, it is easy to say "We have done that."

> Neighbors come in many different varieties. Often they are more concerned with their welfare than being helpful as we believe they should. And the lawyer was about to discover a neighbor was not what comes to your mind right away.

> The story begins with a man falling victim to thieves along the road.

> First a priest comes along. Priests served in the temple offering the sacrifices brought by the public. Everybody knew who they



were and they were highly respected.

They were Jews, our kind of people, highly respectand ed portant religious figures. A lot like would respect a bishop.

Next comes the Levite. They served in the temple as custodians keeping the place clean and in order. Also, if you were to try to enter the temple, you would have to pass by a Levite gatekeeper, as anyone not a Jew would be kept out. Levites too were well known and respected in Jewish life. These two passed the victim by and hurried to get where they were going.

Now comes a Samaritan. These people were not liked and did not like Jews. They were of the other 10 tribes of Israel, many years back, but had mixed marriages with outsiders and were now despised as traitors who had sold out their religion and joined the outside world. The common feeling was like we feel about someone who betrays us. So the words 'Good Samaritan' were never used in the same sentence. These people were abusive to Jews and deserved to be shunned.

This story would have had a jaw-dropping effect on the audience because now they understood that outsiders to the faith were to be the neighbor that they were to love. So now I leave you with the guestion; who is my neighbor?



We need to ask ourselves: Am I going to live for possessions? Popularity?


Am I going to be driven by pressures? Guilt? Bitterness? Materialism? Or am I going to be driven by God's purposes (for my life)?

We may never find what we were looking


for, or understand why things happen the way they did (do).



How Can I Resolve Conflict Well in My Marriage?

We are all self-centered; we all look out for number one, and this leads directly to conflict. As James 4:1-2 says,

From whence come wars and fighting's among you? come they not hence, even of your lusts that war in your members? Ye lust, and have not: ye kill, and desire to have, and cannot obtain: ye fight and war, yet ye have not, because ye ask not. (James 4:1-2)

This is the heart of what makes our conflict ugly. Our sin and selfishness focuses us on our own agenda like the sharpshooter who with the crosshairs of his rifle finds a target. Left to our devices, we will go for what we think is important every single time. And, as you might imagine, when two spouses are focused only on what they want, there is no real hope for peace ... only the real expectation that things will get worse.

The answer for ending selfishness is found in Jesus and His teachings. He showed us that instead of wanting to be first, we must be willing to be last. Instead of wanting to be served, we must serve. Instead of trying to save our lives,

we must lose them. We must love our neighbors (our spouses) as much as we love ourselves. In short, if we want to fix selfishness, we must give up, give in, and give all.

To experience oneness, you must give up your will for the will of another. But to do this, you must first give up your will to Christ, and then you will find it possible to give up your will for that of your mate.

Resolving conflict requires pursuing the other person:

Romans 12:18 says, "If it be possible, as much as lieth in you, live peaceably with all men." The longer I live the more I realize how difficult those words are for many couples. Living peaceably means going after peace. It means "taking the first step" to resolve a difficult conflict rather than waiting for the other person to take the first step.

To pursue the resolution of a conflict means setting aside your own hurt, anger, and bitterness. It means not losing heart. My challenge to you is to "keep your relationships current." In other words, resolve that you will remain in solid fellowship daily with your spouse—as well as with your children, parents, coworkers, and friends. Don't allow Satan to gain a victory by separating you from someone you care about.

Resolving conflict requires loving confrontation:

Confronting your spouse with grace and tactfulness requires wisdom, patience, and humility. Here are a few other tips we've found useful:

1. **Check your motivation.** Will your words help or hurt? Will bringing this up cause healing, wholeness, and oneness, or further separation?

- 2. **Check your attitude.** Loving confrontation says, "I care about you. I respect you and I want you to respect me. I want to know how you feel." Don't hop on your bulldozer and run your partner down. Don't pull up with your dump truck and start unloading all the garbage you've been saving. Approach your partner lovingly.
- Check the circumstances. This includes timing, location, and setting. Don't confront your spouse, for example, when he or she is tired from a hard day's work, or in the middle of settling a squabble between the children.
- 4. **Check to see what other pressures may be present.** Be sensitive to where your spouse is coming from. What's the context of your spouse's life right now?
- 5. During the discussion, stick to one issue at a time. Don't



bring up several. Don't save up a series of complaints and let your spouse have them all at once.

6. Focus on the problem, rather than the person. For example, you need a budget and your mate is something of a spend-thrift. Work through the plans for finances and make the lack of budget the enemy, not your mate.

Above all, focus on understanding your spouse rather than on who is winning or losing. When your spouse confronts you, listen carefully to what is said and what isn't said. It may be that he is upset about something that happened at work and you're getting nothing more than the brunt of that pressure. In other words, you are not the problem and all your spouse is trying to do is express some pent-up frustrations and feelings.

Resolving conflict requires forgiveness:

No matter how hard two people try to love and please each other, they will fail. With failure comes hurt. And the only ultimate relief for hurt is the soothing salve of forgiveness.

The key to maintaining an open, intimate, and happy marriage is to ask for and grant forgiveness quickly. And the ability to do that is tied to each individual's relationship with God.

About the process of forgiveness, Jesus said, For if ye forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you: But if ye forgive not men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses. (Matthew 6:14-15)

The instruction is clear: God insists that we are to be forgivers, and marriage—probably more than any other relationship—presents frequent opportunities to practice.

Forgiving means giving up resentment and the desire to punish. By an act of your will, you let the other person off the hook. And as a Christian you do not do this under duress, scratching and screaming in protest. Rather, you do it with a gentle spirit and love, as Paul urged: And be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath for-

How Can I Resolve Conflict Well in My Marriage?

Few couples like to admit it, but conflict is common to all marriages. We have had our share of conflict and some of our disagreements have not been pretty. We could probably write a book on what not to do!

Start with two selfish people

with different backgrounds and personalities. Now add some bad habits and interesting behavior, throw in a bunch of expectations, and then turn up the heat a little with the daily trials of life. Guess what? You are bound to have conflict. It's unavoidable.

Since every marriage has its tensions, it isn't a question of avoiding them but *how you deal with them*. Conflict can lead to a process that develops oneness or separation. You and your partner must choose how you will act when conflict occurs.

Resolving conflict requires knowing, accepting, and adjusting to your differences:

One reason we have conflict in marriage is that opposites attract. It's strange but that's part of the reason why you married who you did. Your spouse added a variety, spice, and difference to your life that it didn't have before. But after being married for

awhile (sometimes a short while), the attractions become repellents. You may argue over small irritations—such as how to properly squeeze a tube of toothpaste—or over major differences in handling finances or raising children. You may find that your backgrounds and your personalities are so different that you wonder how and why God placed you together in the first place.

It's important to understand these differences, and then to accept and adjust to them. Just as Adam accepted God's gift of Eve, you are called to accept His gift to you. God gave you a spouse who completes you in ways you haven't even learned yet.

Resolving conflict requires defeating selfishness:

All of our differences are magnified in marriage because they feed what is undoubtedly the biggest source of our conflict—our selfish, sinful nature.

Maintaining harmony in marriage has been difficult since Adam and Eve. Two people beginning their marriage together and trying to go their own selfish, separate ways can never hope to experience the oneness of marriage as God intended. The prophet Isaiah portrayed the problem accurately more than 2,500 years ago when he described basic human selfishness like this:

All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way; and the LORD hath laid on him the iniquity of us all. (Isaiah 53:6)
