The Unlimited Power of God by the Operation of the Cross

First Corinthians1:18: For the preaching of the cross is to them that perish foolishness; but unto us which are saved it is the power of God. This unlimited power becomes a reality in a believer's life because it is the power of God that saves us. This can never be accomplished by self-effort or human good works.

Second Corinthians 13:5: Examine yourselves, whether ye be in the faith; prove your own selves. Know ye not your own selves, how that Jesus Christ is in you, except ve be reprobates? "Reprobates" in Greek means rejected, unapproved, worthless. castaway. When we are in the faith by God's grace, we are NOT reprobates, but are operating in the reality of the cross of Christ, which is the unlimited power of God. We cannot put a cap on this power or limit God in our lives.

Dear brothers and sisters, I'm afraid we have denied this power too many times by thinking with our carnal minds. Second Timothy 3:5: *Having a form of*

godliness, but denying the power thereof: from such turn away. We want the power of God yet stay in our worthless state because we have a form of godliness, while in reality we deny His power in our carnality.

How does one come into this power? By trying to be good? By trying hard to believe? By going to all kinds of different churches or crusades where we think the power is? By looking up to someone with a healing ministry? Yes, these things might have their place, but this is not where the unlimited power of God comes from. The power comes from letting the cross of Christ operate in our personal lives. When we are born of the Holy Spirit, Jesus Christ comes into us. Second Corinthians 13:5: Jesus Christ is in you. This must be a reality of the unlimited power in us, or we become reprobates.

If I don't know I have an original sin problem or if I deny it, how can I be healed? I will stay in my sin and sickness, and I will die early.

Please read Revelation 3:17-22:

Because thou sayest, I am rich, and increased with goods, and have need of nothing; and knowest not that thou art wretched, and miserable, and poor, and blind, and naked:

I counsel thee to buy of me gold tried in the fire, that thou mayest be rich; and white raiment, that thou mayest be clothed, and that the shame of thy nakedness do not appear; and anoint thine eyes with eyesalve, that thou mayest see.

As many as I love, I rebuke and chasten: be zealous therefore, and repent.

Behold, I stand at the door, and knock: if any man hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with me.

To him that overcometh will I grant to sit with me in my throne, even as I also overcame, and am set down with my *Father in his throne.*

He that hath an ear, let him hear what the Spirit saith unto the churches.

Please forgive me if I sound negative. I believe there is a healing wave coming over all the earth. Sin will be exposed; sickness will be healed. It will be through the unlimited power of God. This is the kingdom of God and not the kingdom of Satan. Fear and Control – Just Feelings?



May I talk with you about something close to my heart? There is a word I hear a lot of these days, and that word is anxiety. Anxiety, worry, and feeling scared are all the same thing. They can all be summed up in one word, and that is FEAR (false evidence appearing real!). Now don't get me wrong, folks- I do experience fear. In fact, I recently became aware of how much fear has actually been in my life! I used to be irritated by the word "anxiety" and thought I was not much affected by it, but since my mother died, I suddenly became more aware of it and realized it was a bigger issue than I knew!

But I don't think we are all aware of what fear actually is! Did you know it is not just a feeling, but it is actually a spirit? And not one from God either! God tells us in scripture that God has not given us a SPIRIT OF FEAR but of power, love, and sound mind. He also says that Perfect Love (which is Himself) casts out all fear. If it can be cast out, it is not just a feeling!

This revelation has been very beneficial in helping me work through my insecurities, fear, anxiety. When we see something for what it is, we can be much more equipped to handle it.

Something else I feel should be pointed out is our tendency to control if we feel insecure, fearful, or anxious. We will do things to try to make our surroundings or circumstances feel more secure. This is especially true if we have been through a lot of trauma. This is a knee-jerk reaction, but it doesn't make it right.

Now I am not a person who tends to control anyone. I have a lot of grace for others. However, God recently made me aware of a couple of areas where I would try to control. Now if you had been through some of the experiences I was, you would probably have responded in a similar way, but again, it is still control. I just want to share it with you to show you how this works. My husband did a lot of traveling in his business for the last 8 years. It was a sore spot for me and it seemed his trips didn't plan themselves around important events very well at all. I felt very alone and unsupported at home with the children. Some of these years, he spent more time away from home than at home, and worst of all, it was during a fragile time in our marriage and family. But what God started showing me was that I would try my best to keep my husband at home so I could feel safer.

While I think my reaction was very understandable given the circumstances, it was still an area of control. Often it amounts to the simple fact that we do not trust God to protect us from those who hurt us. I can draw a pretty straight line from the moments I didn't trust God to take care of me to the decisions I made in place of trusting Him.

I can also tell you how well they worked out for me! Not. Well. At. All. I spent a good seven years recovering from and cleaning up a mess I made that started about nine years ago. In fact, I am still healing, and so are others. Trust me - it isn't worth it to not trust God. He is much more capable of taking care of us than we are taking care of ourselves! I choose to trust Him. He is my safe place.

How about you?

Will you trust Him to fix your mess?

Will you trust Him to fix your husband or your wife?


Will you try to do it yourself?

This is what some local Amish have observed with regard to non-Amish churches in this area. Why, they exclaim, with no fences the sheep will all disappear! Funny they should say that, since sheep are such a good example of the difference between the Old Testament and New Testament system of governing. Also I appreciate the honest comment that permits a conversation. And my thanks to Andy who told me of this.

In the old system of governing by laws and rules, the penalty is like a fence or wall that prevents straying. You can look at all the green pastures out there and wish you could get into those lush pastures, but fences can not be moved to allow that. If some sheep get outside the fence, the farmer will make sure that the sheep are returned and repairs are made to prevent that from happening again. Laws always need to be tinkered with, since loopholes are found. Farm fences always had to be repaired when I was young, and most likely still do. As do rules.

The name of this particular fence is fear. Break the rules and you will fear the consequences. All governments in the world use the fear principle. For example If the penalty for texting while driving does not stop the violation, then the penalty is increased. Increase the fear factor until you comply. Raise the fence. Turn up the pain for those who do not comply. Such is the thinking of some of my people. Therefore the strictness is increased expecting better compliance. How then does your church even function? All the sheep will be going to the neighbors and never return!

However, under the new covenant, the system is very different. We have a shepherd. The fences do not even exist.

"What then", you may say "keeps the flock together"?

No, we are not serving God out of fear, but out of love. The shepherd has said, in John10, 27 "My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me." That sure makes a difference! Now we have the whole world as pasture! Just ask the shepherd if we could go to those green hills way off on the distance, and you can be sure that if there is a good way to get there safely, he will take you there. This is how the gospel will be taken to the ends of the earth. People called to be a pastor or other service usually are glad to do so, because they love the shepherd.

This verse above also reveals that a relationship exists between sheep and shepherd. I once had a man tell me that God had told him women were to have their dresses a certain distance below the knees. This would mean the shepherd could not tell a female what was proper and a man had to pass on the information, which made me doubt that was indeed true.

There is a vast difference between the two systems. One is driven by fear of breaking through the fence and being punished. Others see what has happened to you and fear doing the same thing. That system works, but there is no relationship needed. In other words, love is missing.

Now we come to the most important command in the Bible. The Sadducees had just been stumped. So an expert in law asked Jesus as written in *Matthew 22:36-40*. *Master, which is the great commandment in the law? Jesus said unto him, Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the*


second is like unto it, Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets.

How, then shall we love God whom we have not seen? Does it seem that love cannot control the sheep? Ah, ves it can! He has shown his love for us by giving his very life for us! The shepherd has redeemed us with his own life. That is the basis of faith in my life, and for countless others. I have to know God loves me for this system to work, otherwise it seems dangerous to step out where others sheep have not gone. That is the core of the New Testament. Unsure of your faith? Don't stay there, read the promises, get the assurance and trust the Lord of our salvation. Otherwise the danger is to get back to fences and that requires no relationship.

Are Christians then obliged to follow the Old Testament law? It was and is a system using fear and punishment. Romans 10; 4 For Christ is the end of the law for righteousness to every one that believeth. If you believe and obey Jesus, the law is fulfilled. My yoke is easy and my burden is light. If you want some guidance on this, start with Matthew's account of the sermon on the mount. What is written seems to apply to everyone that believes. Many missionaries and pastors are called to carry the word of God to various other places. Those are called individually. To hear what God wants for an individual requires a relationship, and relationship requires knowing first, that God loves me and second that I am to love him. This particular view of how the New Testament kingdom works has helped me sort out some things and hope it helps you too!

Persecution

I don't think we have enough persecution today. Some people say we have persecution that is just as hard to bear as in the Dark Ages. Anyway, I think it would be a good thing if we had a little of the old-fashioned kind about now. It would bring out the strongest characters and make us all healthier. I have heard men get up in a prayer meeting, say they were going to make a few remarks, and then keep on till you would think they were going to talk all week. If we had a little persecution, people like that wouldn't talk so much.

Charles Spurgeon used to say that some Christians would make good martyrs. They would burn well because they are so dry. If there were a few stakes for burning Christians, I think it would take all the religiousness out of some men. I admit they haven't got much to start with. If they aren't willing to suffer a little persecution for Christ, they aren't fit to be His disciples. We are told that all that will live godly in Christ Jesus shall suffer persecution (2 Timothy 3:12). If the world has nothing to say

against you, Jesus Christ will have nothing to say for you.

The most glorious triumphs of the church have been won in times of persecution. The early church was persecuted for about three hundred years after the crucifix- ion. Those were years of growth and progress. But then, as Saint Augustine has said, the cross passed from the scene of public executions to the crown of the Caesars, and the downgrade movement began. When the church joined hands with the State, it consistently deteriorated in spirituality and effectiveness. However, the opposition of the State only served to purify it of all impurity. It was persecution that gave Scotland to Presbyterianism. It was persecution that gave this country to civil and religious freedom.

How are we to overcome in time of persecution? Hear the words of Christ. These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation: but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world (John 16:33). Paul could testify that, though persecuted, he was never forsaken. The Lord stood by him, strengthened him, and delivered him out of all his persecutions and afflictions.

Many shrink from the Christian life because they will be mocked. Then sometimes when persecution won't bring a man down, flattery will. Foolish people often come up to a man after he has preached and flatter him. Sometimes ladies do that. Perhaps they will say to some worker in the church, "You talk a great deal better than so-and-so." He becomes proud and struts around as if he was the most important person in the town. I tell you, we have a wily devil to contend with. If he can't overcome you with opposition, he will try flattery or

ambition. If that doesn't serve his purpose, perhaps there will come some affliction or disappointment, and he will overcome in that way. Remember, anyone who has Christ to help him can overcome every foe and overcome them singly or collectively. Let them come. If we have Christ within us, we will overthrow them all. Remember what Christ is able to do. In all the ages, men have stood in greater temptations than you and I will ever have to meet.

There is one more thing to consider. I have to overcome the world, or the world is going to overcome me. I have to conquer sin in me and get it under my feet, or it is going to conquer me. Some people are satisfied with one or two victories and think that's good enough. We have got to do something more than that. It's a battle all the time. We can be encouraged by the fact that we are assured of victory in the end. We are promised a glorious triumph.

To Him That Overcomes

In the book of Revelation, the author makes eight promises to those who overcome in this life.

To him that overcometh will I give to eat of the tree of life, which is in the midst of the paradise of God (Revelation 2:7). He will have a right to the tree of life. When Adam fell, he lost that right. God turned him out of Eden so that he couldn't eat of the tree of life and live forever. Perhaps He took that tree and transplanted it to the garden above. Through the second Adam, we are offered the right to eat of it.

He that overcometh shall not be hurt of the second death (Revelation 2:11). Death holds no power over him. It cannot touch him. Why? Because Christ tasted death, and through His death gained victory for every man. Death may

take this body, but that is all. This is only the house I live in. We should have no fear of death if we overcome.

To him that overcometh will I give to eat of the hidden manna, and will give him a white stone, and in the stone a new name written, which no man knoweth saving he that receiveth it (Revelation 2:17). If I overcome, God will feed me with bread that the world knows nothing about, and He will give me a new name.

He that overcometh, and keepeth my works unto the end, to him will I give power over the nations (Revelation 2:26). Think of it. What a thing to have, power over the nations. A man that is able to rule himself is the man that God can trust with power. Only a man who can govern himself is fit to govern other men. It seems like we are down here in training, and God is just polishing us for higher service. The details may not be specific, but God's Word tells us that we will reign with Him.

He that overcometh, the same shall be clothed in white raiment; and I will not blot out his name out of the book of life, but I will confess his name before my Father, and before his angels (Revelation 3:5). Jesus will present us to the Father in white garments, without spot or wrinkle. Every fault and stain will be removed. We will be made perfect. He that overcomes will not be a stranger in heaven.

Him that overcometh will I make a pillar in the temple of my God, and he shall go no more out: and I will write upon him the name of my God, and the name of the city of my God, which is new Jerusalem, which cometh down out of heaven from my God: and I will write upon him my new name (Revelation 3:12). Imagine no more backsliding and no more wandering over the dark mountains of

sin. We will be forever with the King.

He says, *I will write upon him the name of my God*. He is going to put His name on us. Isn't it grand? That is something worth fighting for.

It is said that when Muhammad came in sight of Damascus and found that the people had all left the city, he said, "If they won't fight for this city, what will they fight for?" If men won't fight here for all this reward, what will they fight for?

To him that overcometh will I grant to sit with me in my throne, even as I also overcame, and am set down with my Father in his throne (Revelation 3:21). My heart has often melted as I have looked at that passage. The Lord of glory comes down and says, "I will grant to you to sit on My throne, even as I sit on My Father's throne, if you will just overcome." Isn't it worth a struggle? Countless many fight for a crown that will fade away. Yet, we are to be placed above the angels, archangels, seraphim, and cherubim. We will be placed upon the throne, and we will remain forever with Him. May God put strength into every one of us to fight the battle of life, so we may sit with Him on His throne.

When Emperor Frederick III of Germany was dying, his own son would not have been allowed to sit with him on the throne. Nor did the son have the authority to let anyone else sit there with him. Yet, we are told that we are joint heirs with Jesus Christ, and we will sit with Him in glory.

Finally, He that overcometh shall inherit all things; and I will be his God, and he shall be my son (Revelation 21:7). My dear friends, isn't that a high calling? I used to have my Sunday school children sing, "I want to be an angel," but have not done so for years. We will be above angels. We will be sons of God. We will inherit all things. Do you ask how much

I'm worth? I don't know. The Rothschilds cannot compute their wealth. They don't even know how many millions they own. My condition is the same. I haven't the slightest idea how much I'm worth. God has no poor children. If we overcome, we will inherit all things.

What an inheritance. Let's get the victory through Jesus Christ, our Lord and Master.

How would you respond if someone were to ask you the following two questions: Why do you think Jesus came to earth, and in what way did you personally benefit from it?

Most of the answers I'd receive would probably revolve around the idea that Jesus came to earth to take away our sins. While this is correct, and praise God that it is, it is only partially right. As wonderful as it is to have Jesus take away our sins, he came to earth to do a lot more than just that. Let's take some time to look at a few more of reasons that Jesus gave his life on earth so many years ago.

First, in Matthew we read that Mary was told she would bring forth a son. She was told to name her son Jesus because He would "save His people from their sins." Just as most people assume, one of the reasons Jesus came to earth was to save us from our sins. Not only did He come to save us from our sins, but He also came to give us power to become the children of God and to give us the ability to stop living in our sins as lost and unsaved.

Another reason that Jesus came and gave His life on earth was to redeem us. *Redeem* means to vindicate or to set free. In my lifetime, I have seen many people who were bound in sins and strongholds; these people longed to be free, but there were demons controlling their lives. In spite of all of their human efforts, they continued to be bound; the name of Jesus was the only thing that could eventually set them free. Today, because of His power, these same people are able to walk in complete freedom. When we walk with Jesus in the Spirit, we shall not fulfill the lusts of the flesh.

After a person is redeemed, Jesus will give restoration. The Bible says that "He leadeth me beside the still waters; he restoreth my soul..." *To restore* means to bring back to a previous condition after having been left to deteriorate. Sometimes, a person will buy an old, junky vehicle, and with much labor, effort, and time, they are able to restore what most would see as a piece of junk into a beautiful new usable work of art. In the same way, after Jesus takes away our past sins, He saves us from our sins, redeems us, and restores us!

Restoring a vehicle is certainly a labor of love. A person must see beyond the rust and deterioration; he must see a finished product in the future that is worth all the labor and effort it takes to get to that point. In the same way, Jesus also sees us as a labor of love; no one ever put as much time and effort into a restoration project as Jesus did for me and you.

Another reason Jesus came to earth was to take away the curse of the law. Galatians 3:13 says, "For Christ has redeemed us from the curse of the law." Jesus gave us the ability to no longer live under the law and to instead live in grace.

Finally, Jesus came to earth to re-establish a relationship with God; He became our mediator. 1 Timothy 2:5 says, "For there

is one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus." A mediator is a go-between person or a reconciler; he is a person, who brings two parties together. This is exactly what Christ did for us when he died on the cross.

Wow! Thank you, Lord Jesus. I am sure there are many more reasons that you and I benefit from Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. I have found it to be a great inspiration in my daily walk to simply say: "Thank you Jesus, for what you did for me." Today, instead of just focusing on being thankful for having my sins forgiven, I can also be grateful for lots more.

I have just one more thought in closing. When Christ, who is our life, shall appear, then shall we also appear with Him in glory (Colossians 3:4). At this meeting, we become joint heirs with Christ. Think on that thought for a minute.

I recently updated and made changes to my will. One thing, however, that always stays the same is that my children are my joint heirs. They are to receive equally, not because they earned it, but because they are my children. In the same way, we are joint heirs with Christ. This truth tells me one thing: God sees us as equal sons and daughters, equal to His only begotten son Himself.

In spite of who they were and where they came from, in spite of their failures, shortcomings and total mess ups, Jesus loved them unconditionally and continued to believe in them.



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Why Would a Good Father Punish His Children?

Heb. 12:6 For whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth, and scourgeth every son whom he receiveth.

For years I struggled with the idea of God's chastening in my life. Especially the idea of God chastening me without me knowing why. I would never punish my own children without first making sure they understand why. And yet I had to be honest, in many of the difficult things I've faced in my life, I have not had a clear reason for them. Is there a difference between trials and chastening? How can I know the difference? You cannot love and trust a God who seems to delight in hurting you. And yet scriptures are very clear on the value and need for God's chastening in our lives. This is by no means conclusive, but here are a few thoughts that have helped clear things up for me.

First of all, I believe the Word is clear, there is a chastening in the form of sowing and reaping. (Gal. 6:7-9) And there's the chastening that comes from straying from God's will. (Ps. 119:67) In both of these I believe God will make it clear why we are being chastened if we want to know. And I also believe God has no delight in chastening of this nature. Rather, His delight is in showing mercy and blessing, and lifting the chastening as soon as He sees we've learned what He's trying to teach us. He's a good Father.

One of the meanings for the word "chastening" is "discipline; training and education of children." So much of the difficult

times we go through are intended to teach us things. It's here that we receive the revelation of Jesus and the completion we have in Him. I believe this is an endless process. As we see the immensity of the value of the revelation of our completion in Christ, it becomes easier to suffer the pain and the loss. (Phil. 3:7-8)

And then we have what is described in 2 Cor. 4 and 12. The chastening that ministers poverty, weakness and death. The only way the power of Christ can work through us is by a continual weakening and death (letting go) of our natural strength. This is an endless process and extremely important. It makes us "poor in spirit" weak and dependent on God alone. It keeps us pliable and teachable. It can only be endured by faith...without faith it will embitter and destroy a person. But all of the godly people we've appreciated the most, have gone, and are going through this continual process. During the time the tabernacle was being built, man had already learned how to pour hot metals into forms in order to make their desired objects. However, all the gold objects to be used in God's service were to be made of "beaten gold." This means every piece was made from a lump of gold and beaten into something useful and beautiful, one blow at a time. Gold is very malleable. This such a beautiful and prophetic picture of God's way with us in the new Covenant.
