The Bible Club program is a Bible mail correspondence course, and because of God's blessings, it has grown and continues to grow. We send out over 4,000 Bible lessons every two weeks, and so far this year we have recorded 229 salvations! To God be the glory!

It takes a lot of work by a lot of people to get the lessons done, and it also takes a LOT of money. Neither the Bible lessons nor the postage are free. Each lesson costs 25–55 cents, and to mail each lesson costs an additional 35–45 cents. Multiply both of those by 4,000 and you have a good idea of what it costs us every two weeks to mail out the Bible lessons.

In addition to our Bible lessons, we send

out delinquent-student letters to get students back on track who have fallen behind, and we send out prizes for our awards program, encouraging our current students to remain faithful. We also have our promotion program, encouraging our students to invite others to join the Bible Club. The work never ends.

The Bible Club program is run almost entirely by volunteers, but we need more people, and even possibly paid positions for data entry. This, of course, cannot happen until God blesses us with the volunteers or the financial means to hire the needed computer data entry people.

I am praying that God will bless the Bible

Club with a trust fund or other steady means of support. This could be a gift that will keep on giving long after the person who gives it has gone on to be with Jesus. It would be a gift that will continue to see souls saved for years to come. Will you be that person? If God has

blessed you financially, won't you pass that blessing on to the Bible Club?



Whatever

amount you can give, whether big or small, will be appreciated and used to reach children with the truth and love of Jesus. If you don't have money to give, then come and be a volunteer. Give of your time. There is much to do, and the Lord needs laborers for His harvest. We need graders, tapers, lessons put together, and of course, our biggest volunteer need is for computer data entry people.

Before our CommUnity Crusade began, many of us faced opposition from the religious community in Middlefield. There



My name is Sarah Yoder, and I'm excited to be able to share my testimony and all that God has done in my life.

I am a mother to four precious little girls, and I've lived in Wisconsin for the past sixteen years. I grew up in a religious culture where strict rules and guidelines were practiced on a daily basis. I believed that it was necessary for me to follow those rules to an exact *T* in order to go to heaven. Therefore, I was very dedicated to my religion, even when rules didn't make sense to me and I wasn't always happy with them.

I got married within my culture, and my husband and I struggled a lot in our marriage. Because of our struggles, we went through months of counseling. Our counseling sessions kept us from our children for months at a time.

After my husband and I returned home, we noticed some of the same issues arising in our marriage. Since we weren't able to find answers through our

counseling, I turned to the Bible with an open mind and a longing heart. It took a lot to make me turn away from religion and search for something better, because I knew that if I followed anything other than the rules and guidelines of my church, I would be excommunicated from the people I was closest to—including my own family.

When I read verses like Romans 3:23, which says, For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God, and Romans 3:10, which says, As it is written, There is none righteous, no, not one, I knew that the Bible was talking about me. This realization put me on the same level with everybody else.

The Amish call anybody outside the Amish religion "worldly." For this reason, I thought I was part of God's chosen few, and I felt fortunate to have been born into the Amish culture. I thought I was so lucky. Today, though, I realize that we all have the same need, and that need is for a Savior. Jesus, the Son of God, came down to this earth to fulfill the law and to free us from the law, because we as human beings were not able to fulfill it. He took the sins of the world on Himself, died on the cross, and arose again victoriously from the grave.
