Dear Friend:

On Thursday, September 6, Velda Miller, formerly Amish, moved into New Beginnings Homestead and took on the responsibilities of caring for single women who come to the MAP Ministry for a fresh start—see Velda's testimony on the back cover. On Saturday, September 8, God sent Esther to us—she came in from WI. Next came Sadie from MI, followed by Maria and her little boy, Caleb, from Middlefield, OH. By October, Rebecca, from MO, moved in, followed by Ellen from PA. At least one or two others are wanting to move in.

Of the five women who moved into New Beginnings, one had left the Amish seven years ago. It all started when she got connected with a non-Amish salesperson who had come to her dad's

farm to sell farm gates. Even though the man was twenty years older than her, she was looking for a way out of the Amish. As a result, the man took her back to his home and, for the most part, held her in captivity for seven years. The young lady was not allowed to get a driver's license, have a cell phone, or get a job. She was also forbidden from talking to any of her neighbors.

When this precious woman finally got out of her situation, a relative connected her with MAP and asked if we could help. We helped her find a job and get started in counseling. She is currently saving up money for a car.

As much as is possible, we want to provide jobs at Beyond Measure Market.

Velda's New Beginning —Velda Kaye Miller



I grew up in an Amish community in LaGrange, Indiana. Outwardly, I appeared to be a pretty good kid, but my heart and soul were anything but good. I hated life, myself, my parents, and especially God. Depression and darkness were some of my closest friends during my late childhood and teenage years.

Even though I hated God, I knew that there had to be more to Him than rules and harshness. I searched for truth during my teen years, never dreaming that my search would lead me to where it did. One morning in April of 2014, I was sitting in the office of my counselor, and we started praying about all the things in my heart: the pain, the hurt, the anger, the bitterness, the sins of others against me, my own sins, and most importantly, we prayed for my salvation. When I walked away from the office that day, I was a new person. I knew I had met Jesus for the first time in my life, and it was beautiful.

Even though I was now a new person, I did not then consider leaving the Amish.

While I did not necessarily like all the Amish rules and inconsistencies, I figured that staying was still just the thing to do. I realized what would happen if I left, and I knew it would not be very pleasant.

During this time, I was working as a caretaker for a wonderful Christian lady who was physically weak but spiritually strong. During the two years I took care of her, she always exemplified Christ. Her pastor, who would often come to visit her, was also a big influence in my life. I had many conversations with him, and I realized there was much more to life than following rules and being Amish. These things did not and could not save me.

About four and a half months after I got saved, I left the Amish and moved in with my pastor's sister and her husband. It was a struggle to experience the shunning, as well as adjusting to a new life. However, my new family, my pastor and his wife, and my church family all stood behind me to offer support and encouragement.

When I left the Amish, I knew that I wanted to further my education, so I started on my GED right away. A year later, I attended a small Bible college in Kentucky. During my first year at college, God reaffirmed a call He had placed on my life shortly after I got saved—a desire to help young women find freedom and rest in Jesus Christ. During my second month at college, God spoke to my heart

from Acts 26:17-18: *Delivering thee from the people, and from the Gentiles, unto whom now I send thee, To open their eyes, and to turn them from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan unto God, that they may receive forgiveness of sins, and inheritance among them which are sanctified by faith that is in me.* I did not appreciate it very much at that time, because I thought God wanted me to go back to the Amish. I pushed those verses as far back in my mind as possible.

In early 2018, I connected with MAP through watching a video series called "Breaking the Silence." I contacted Joe, and we kept in contact for the next few months. God brought me back to Acts 26:17-18, and this time I was ready to listen. I visited MAP Ministry in June and had an interview with them in August. I followed God's call and was accepted to work with the young women in the New Beginnings apartments.

In the short time that I have been at New Beginnings, there have been both challenges and rewards. Not all the girls who have come have stayed. I have seen bad choices being made, but I have also seen good choices and progress. At the time of this writing, there are three girls, a baby, and an intern occupying the apartments. Please pray for the girls, their salvation, their Christian growth, and for me as I work with them. —Velda Miller
