INTRODUCTION:

Are you moved to take some sort of action after your teacher shares God's Word with you? Or do you just sit there and gaze with a blank stare at the wall? The student has a responsibility Months later, his class was the most exciting class in the entire Sunday school. When one of his students was asked what made the difference, the reply was: "Before, our teacher just read us the Bible stories. Now, we have so much more—he challenges us to act out the stories in the Bible and to join him in doing so. For the first time, we feel like we are ministering together." Few people are as important to a society or to God as are teachers. The relationship between teacher and student is a subject that is never stressed enough within the church. The present passage deals with this subject, in particular with the student's responsibilities to the teacher. Keep in mind that every believer is a student who sits at the feet of God's teachers whether they be ministers or Bible teachers.

1. HOW TO DO GOOD TO A TEACHER: BY SHARING IN THE MINISTRY OF THE TEACHER (v. 6).

How does a believer do good to a teacher? Very simply, by communicating and sharing in the ministry of the teacher. This means much more than just giving financial support. Of course it means financial support; but as stated, it means much more. Note that Scripture is speaking directly to the *learner*, that is, to a believer in the church, to the person who is *taught in the Word of God*. The learner has a responsibility to the teacher just as the teacher has a responsibility to the learner. What is that responsibility?

To share with the teacher in all good things and to participate in the ministry of the teacher. The learner shares in the ministry of the teacher by...

- *being present* when the teacher teaches
- *being attentive and learning* what the teacher teaches
- *sharing in discussions* of what the teacher teaches
- *passing on* what the teacher teaches
- participating with the teacher in his or her full ministry
- *supporting* the teacher financially
- encouraging others to come and learn from the teacher

Note another point: the reference to the "Word" means the Word of God. A teacher should always be teaching the Word of God, and a learner should always be sure that he is sitting under a teacher who is teaching the Word of God. "Let the elders [ministers] that rule well be counted worthy of double honour, especially they who labour in the word and doctrine. For the scripture saith, Thou shalt not muzzle the ox that treadeth out the corn. And, The labourer is worthy of his reward" (1 Tim 5:17-18).

ILLUSTRATION:

One of the most rewarding experiences for a teacher is when his or her students capture the truth and apply it to other people.

Years ago, a Christian football coach invested a good portion of his life in his players and coaches. A stickler for details, his philosophy on offense and defense was branded into the minds of his assistant coaches. He spent just as much energy sharing his philosophy on what made up good character as he did on the actual game of football. An active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, his faith in Christ became contagious. Through his witness, many of his coaches and players became believers.

As the years went by, some of his players and assistant coaches went on to coach at other schools. Showing striking evidence that they had been mentored by this great coach, the philosophy for each of their teams mirrored what they had learned. The offense was the same. The defense was played the same. And in more important matters, godly character was stressed and expected. Like their former coach—their mentor, their teacher—Christ was seen in each of their lives. Through one man's influence, many young men came to know Jesus Christ personally. His students were sharing in his ministry literally—both on and off the field of play.

A good teacher reproduces what is in him. A good student shares what he has learned with others. Just as we are all teachers in some areas of life, we are all students in others areas. Are you sharing in the ministry of your teachers by passing on what you have learned to others?

QUESTIONS:

1. What practical things can you do to share in the ministry of your teacher?

- 2. Are you currently participating in your teacher's ministry? How valuable is the input of individuals in any class setting?
- 3. What would happen to your class if everyone participated in the teacher's ministry? What has to occur in order for this to happen? What would be your role in this? As the teacher? As the learner?

2. WHY DO GOOD TO A TEACHER (vv. 7-9).

Two very strong reasons are given.

1. A person can be deceived about facing the judgment of God. The word deceived means to be led astray. Some Galatians were being led astray in this matter. They were failing to share in the ministry of Paul, becoming critics instead of supporters. And note what attacking the teacher of God equals: it equals mocking God. The word "mocked" means to turn one's nose up at God. By rejecting God's minister, the teacher whom God had sent to them, the Galatians were rejecting God. They were not only mocking and turning their noses up at the teacher of God, but they were mocking God. However, Scripture declares in no uncertain terms: "God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man sows, that shall he also reap." If a man sows a life ...

- that is not present when the teacher teaches
- that is not attentive and learning what the teacher teaches
- that does not pass on what the teacher teaches
- that does not participate with the teacher in his ministry
- that does not encourage others to learn from the teacher

... if a man sows this rejection, this turning up of the nose, he rejects and turns his nose up at God. And if he rejects God, he shall be rejected by God. Whatever a man sows toward his teacher, he reaps. He shall bear the judgment of his behavior toward God's teacher.

a. If a believer sows corruption to his flesh, he shall reap corruption (v.8). If he does not listen to the teacher's warnings about the lusts of the flesh, he shall reap the lusts of the flesh. He will be overtaken by the appeal, pull, cravings, passion, and lust ...

- to worship as he desires •
- to seek his destiny from astrology and sorcery • instead of prayer
- to live as he pleases •
- to seek earthly position, power, and honor •
- to strive against others as he pleases •
- to party as he likes •
- to have illicit sex •

- to hoard
- to seek the things of this world •

The list could go on and on, but the point is well understood. The flesh perishes. It ages, dies, and decays. If a person sows to the flesh, he shall go the way of all flesh: die and face the judgment of God. God will not be His Word. If a man rejects God's messenger and chooses to sow to his flesh, he shall reap the flesh and its destiny: death and judgment. God is not mocked; there is no escape.

"For to be carnally [fleshly] minded is death; but to be spiritually minded is life and peace. Because the carnal mind is enmity against God: for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be. So then they that are in the flesh cannot please God" (Ro. 8:6-8).

b. If a believer sows to the Spirit, he shall reap life everlasting. If he listens to the teacher's exhortations about the salvation that is in God's Son and the life God expects him to live, he shall reap the Spirit of God. The Spirit of God will actually enter his life and take up residence there. The Spirit will implant the divine nature of God within the heart of the believer, the divine nature that shall live now and forever. The believer will be enabled (given the strength and power) to live a life of...

• love

• long-suffering • gentleness

- faithfulness
- meekness

• joy

• goodness

• self-control

And most importantly, as stated, he shall live forever with God in the new heavens and earth

"And as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the son of man be lifted up: that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have eternal life" (Jn. 3:14-15).

2. A person shall reap if he does not faint in serving with his teacher. The believer or pupil must join with his teacher in the ministry if he wishes to reap the reward. He must not...

- withdraw
- fall back
- slack off
- allow weariness
- allow routineness

The pupil must be constant, steadfast, and persevering-just as he is taught to be by his teacher. He must join right in with his teacher in serving the Lord Jesus Christ.

- give in to pressure • allow interruptions
- cave in to persecution
- give in to temptation

• peace

"Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord" (1 Co. 15:58).

Note the motive for not fainting: the student shall reap in due season. The day of reaping is coming. God is going to reward the pupil (believer) who serves and works by the side of his teacher.

"And whosoever shall give to drink unto one of these little ones a cup of cold water only in the name of a disciple, verily I say unto you, he shall in no wise lose his reward" (Mt. 10:42).

QUESTIONS:

- 1. What kinds of things have you sown that will reap a blessing?
- 2. If you sow bad things, can you expect to reap life? Explain your answer.
- 3. What would cause some Christians to look for a blessing after they have knowingly sown to their flesh?
- 4. What kinds of things do you need to do in order to firm up your commitment to your teacher's ministry?

3. WHEN TO SERVE WITH A TEACHER: AS WE HAVE OPPORTUNITY (v.10).

When is a believer to serve with his teacher? Very simply, at every opportunity. He is to join right in and do good every chance he can. The idea is that he is to...

- stay alert to opportunity
- keep his eyes open to make opportunities
- rush to all opportunities

When a teacher goes to meet a need, the believer must not miss the opportunity to join his teacher and minister with him. No chance to minister should ever be missed. With each missed opportunity, a believer can miss the privilege of ministering and of being more greatly rewarded in the glorious day of redemption. Therefore, he must stay alert and not be weary if he wants a full reward.

Note to whom he is to minister: to all men (unbelievers), but especially to believers. A person is responsible for his own family first; then he adds on the burden of the world. God has placed us all within a family, and we are the ones who are first responsible for that family. Others may help us, but we are the ones who are primarily responsible. The same is true with the family of God. A Christian brother is the one who is responsible for the family of God. Therefore, we must always meet the needs of our Christian family before moving on out among unbelievers.

"But love ye your enemies, and do good, and lend, hoping for nothing again; and your reward shall be great, and ye shall be the children of the Highest: for he is kind unto the unthankful and to the evil" (Luke 6:35).

"Therefore to him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is sin" (James 4:17).

QUESTIONS:

- 1. How often do you skip regular times of Bible study with your teacher? What kinds of things cause you not to attend?
- 2. Do you have a role in your teacher's ministry? Are you fulfilling it?
- 3. Are you comfortable with your level of commitment to your teacher's ministry? What changes do you need to make?
- 4. When is the best time to serve with your teacher?
- 5. What is the priority of ministry? Who comes first? Why?

SUMMARY:

Contrary to popular belief, your teacher is not required by God to do all the work of the ministry. He or she is called to equip other believers for the work of the ministry. The responsibilities of the student are clearly outlined:

- 1. How to do good to a teacher: by sharing in the ministry of the teacher.
- 2. Why do good to a teacher.
- 3. When to serve with a teacher: as we have opportunity.

ILLUSTRATION:

How willing are you for His will? This is a question that every believer must answer whenever opportunities to minister are made available. God has provided plenty of work to do. The key is this: be ready to serve when He opens the door. Sometimes, that open door comes at a great personal sacrifice:

"You are going out to die in a year or two. It is madness!" That is what a tutor in Oxford University, England, said to a brilliant student who was giving himself under the auspices of a missionary society for service in Africa.

It turned out that the young man did die after being on the PERSONAL JOURNAL NOTES field only a year, but he had answered his tutor in these wise (Reflection & Response) and weighty words: "I think it is with African missions as 1. > We need a divine relationship, or a connection with the Divine One, to develop the love and wisdom needed for other relationships. Having a heart-towith God heart connection and experiencing intimacy with Him exposes us to pure love-the kind of love that removes our own hurts and insecurities, and frees us to love the way He does. Knowing how He views us, and being

secure in that knowledge, releases us from needing to know how others view us, and frees us from the bondage that comes from needing their approval. It also opens our eyes to how Jesus sees others, and enables us to love them with His love, to communicate lovingly, and to give honor and respect, even when it is not deserved.

This is the way of Jesus—the way of true love.

If you cannot trust someone, usually you do not feel too inclined to build a relationship with him or her. On the other hand, if you 🕤 feel that someone does not trust you, you often feel quite disrespected.

Lack of communication also quickly causes a feeling of disrespect. Clear, loving communication, even in difficult circumstances, often prevents

misunderstandings and much grief. Avoiding communication about difficult issues often causes questions to arise in the relationship and at least one party will feel disrespected. Of course, it is good to take some time to think things over and to pray, but then it is a good idea to clearly and kindly communicate your perspective and to give the other party an opportunity to share their perspective, as well.

Heavy Heart – Lost at Sea

My sins were a constant burden and reminder that, indeed, there was a God who had created within me a conscience. I knew, beyond any doubt, that when life here ended, there was a real Heaven to gain and a literal burning Hell to be avoided at any cost; but I tried to tell myself that I was already a Christian. I had no peace about it, and I tried to do everything not to think about it.

Those dark days of storms, hurricanes, waves crashing over the entire ship, and nights with the wind tugging at the anchor caused me to think of eternity. I was truly "Lost at Sea."

Not Going Home – Going Home

After miraculously arriving safely back in Miami that November, the Lord, through various circumstances, changed my mind about not going home. I had been determined to continue my quest for peace, in spite of all God had shown me and through which He had allowed me to survive. Up until then, I had my heart set on another adventure to California via motorcycle, but God had other plans. I walked down the jet way in Detroit on a cold November morning, wondering if I was in my right mind to return home.

I let my family know that I was not returning home as the prodigal son, but that I had my own plans, which did not include them. Well, after being in the biggest cities in the U.S. and then coming home to a small town, it was more of a letdown than ever. go to church to see some of my old friends. The church was having some special services conducted by two visiting evangelists. I had no intention of listening. After all, I had heard it a thousand times before.



The preacher was speaking forcefully and loudly about one of the last things Jesus said while on the cross. It was the phrase, "It is finished," that caught my attention. He kept repeating it and explaining what it meant. He said that it meant there was nothing we could do to save ourselves, that the work was already done, and that all of our sins were completely paid for. He said that all we could do was to rest in it.

In a moment of time, it flooded over me. It was something I had heard many times, but never realized until then—that Jesus, having no sins of His own, took my place and paid the price to satisfy the justice of a Holy God. Furthermore, God was so pleased with the finished work that He raised Him from the dead with His mighty power.

Peace Comes in Like a Flood

The wonder of it all! Then the thought crossed my mind. Could it be so simple? The peace that flooded through me that night and in the days ahead was the answer to that. Repetitions and traditions which are not scriptural date at least all the way back to the



Time

What is Time? To some, time seems to drag on and on forever and ever. To others, time seems to be flying past like a loose kite caught in the wind. For some people, time is a gift that they cherish while it lasts. For others, time is work that must be struggled through day by day until it is gone. How can time be one thing, yet different to everyone?

Webster's New World Dictionary takes almost half a page describing the word time. That does not include all of the similar words or phrases like: times, many a time, time of day, or time after time. The first definition for time is "indefinite, unlimited duration in which things are considered as happening in the past, present, or future; every moment there has ever been or ever will be." That definition raises some very important questions. How many moments have there been? How many moments will there be? What does that mean to me? I will try to answer these questions in the following paragraphs.

How many moments have there been? I believe that time began when the universe began. Time and space are so closely intertwined that it would be crazy to believe they started separately. In fact, Genesis 1:1 states that they were created together, along with the other basic element of the universe-matter. It says, "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth." "In the beginning" clearly refers to the beginning of time itself. "God created the heaven" clearly refers to the creation of space. "... and the earth" refers to the creating of matter. The reason the different phrases and words are used to describe the creation of the universe is that the Hebrews did not have a word for universe. Using different words in that case is acceptable, because it refers to the

same thing—the universe.

God then went on to create everything in the universe in six literal days (a unit of

time). Although God created time. He exists outside of it. Man was created after time, leaving man in his physical form bound in time. God would down come very often to walk with Adam and Eve-the people whom He had made. This

puts God, the One who exists outside of time, with man, His creations bound by the limits of time. Even though man was still immortal, he still experienced time. When God was not walking with them one time, they sinned. They directly defied God's orders, adding death to time. This shows that once there was time, but no death. Nowadays we place time and death together, when they are really two different things.

Ever since then, man has been born, has lived, and has died. He then is sent into the realm of infinite time known as eternity. This is different from God's eternity, because He is outside of time. I believe we will always exist in time, because time is good, and it was a part of the original creation. That answers the question of how many moments there will be and leads us to the last question.

There are two ways by which a man may lose his own soul. What are they?

1. He may lose his soul by living and dying without any religion at all. He may live and die like a beast, prayerless, godless, graceless, faithless. This is a sure way to hell. Mind that you do not walk in it.

2. He may lose his soul by taking up some kind of religion. He may live and die contenting himself with a false Christianity and resting on a baseless hope. This is the commonest way to hell there is.

What do I mean by useless kinds of religion? I will tell you. The first thing I wish to say is this. A religion is entirely useless in which Jesus Christ is not the principal object and does not fill the principal place.

There are only too many baptized men and women who practically know nothing about Christ. Their religion consists in a few vague notions and empty expressions. "They trust they are no worse than others; they keep to their Church; they try to do their duty; they do nobody any harm; they hope God will be merciful to them! They trust the Almighty will pardon their sins and take them to heaven when they die." This is about the whole of their religion.

But what do these people know practically about Christ? Nothing: nothing at all! What experiential acquaintance have they with His offices His mediation. His priesthood. His intercession? None: none at all! Ask them about a saving faithask them about being born again of the Spirit—ask them about being sanctified in Christ Jesus. What answer will you get? You are a barbarian to them You have asked

them simple Bible questions; but they know no more about them experientially than a Buddhist or a Muslim.

And yet this is the religion of hundreds of thousands of people who are called Christians all over the world.

If you are a man of this kind, I warn you plainly that such Christianity will never take you to heaven. It may do very well in the eyes of men; it may pass muster very decently at the [church] meeting, in the place of business, in the House of Commons, or in the streets. But it will never comfort you. It will never satisfy your conscience. It will never save your soul.

I warn you plainly that all notions and theories about God being merciful without Christ and excepting through Christ are baseless delusions and empty fancies. Such theories are purely an idol of man's invention. They are all of the

from heaven. The God of heaven has sealed and appointed Christ as the one and only Savior and way of life; and all who would be saved must be content to be saved by Him, or they will never be saved at all. I give you fair warning. A

religion without Christ will never save your soul (Joh 14:6)!

But I have another thing yet to say. A religion is entirely useless in which you join anything with Christ in the matter of saving your soul. You must not only depend on Christ for salvation, but you must depend on Christ only and Christ alone (Eph 2:8-9).

There are multitudes of baptized men and women who profess to honor Christ, but in reality do Him great dishonor. They give Christ a certain place in their system of religion, but not the place which God intended Him to fill. Christ alone is not "all in all" to their souls (Eph 1:23). No: it is either Christ and the Church, or Christ and the Sacraments, or Christ and His ordained ministers, or Christ and their own goodness, or Christ and their own prayers, or Christ and their own

sincerity and charity—on which they practically rest their souls.

If you are a Christian of this kind I warn you also plainly that your religion is an offence to God. You are changing God's plan of salvation into a plan of your own devising. You are, in effect, deposing Christ from His throne by giving the glory due to Him to another. I care not who it is that teaches you your religion and on whose word you build. Whether he be Pope or Cardinal, Archbishop or Bishop, Dean or Archdeacon, Presbyter Deacon. Episcopalian or or Presbyterian. Baptist or Independent, Plymouth Methodist or Brotherwhosoever adds anything to Christ, teaches you wrong (Gal 1:6-8).

I care not what it is that you add to Christ. Whether it be the necessity of joining the Church of Rome, or of being an Episcopalian, or of becoming a Free Churchman, or of giving up the liturgy, or

of being baptized. . ., whatever you may righteousness for us (Dan 9:24). He practically add to Christ in the matter of redeemed us from the curse of a broken

salvation, you do Christ an injury.

Take heed what you are doing. Beware of giving to Christ's servants the honour due to none but Christ. Beware of giving the Lord's ordinances the honour due unto the

Lord. Beware of resting the burden of your soul on anything but Christ, and Christ alone. Beware of having a religion which is of no use, and cannot save.

[Christ] left the glory He had from all eternity with the Father and came down into the world to provide salvation. He took our nature upon Him and was born as a man. As a man He did the will of God perfectly (Mat 17:5), which we all had left undone (Rom 3:23). As a man He suffered on the cross the wrath of God which we ought to have suffered (Rom 6:23). He brought in everlasting



law (Luk 1:68; Rev 5:9). He opened a fountain for all sin and uncleaness. He died for our sins. He rose again for our justification (Rom 4:25)). He ascended to God's right hand, and there sat down, waiting till His enemies should be made his footstool (Luk

20:42-43). And there He sits now, [calling] to all who will come to Him, interceding for all who believe in Him, and managing by God's appointment all that concerns the salvation of souls (Joh 3; Eph 1-2; Rom 3-5).

It is an awful thing to have no religion at all. To have an immortal soul committed to your charge and neglect it this is dreadful. But it's no less an awful thing to be content with a religion that can do you no good.

Do you struggle with lust or other sins and addictions?

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
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The Mount of Olives

Question: "What happened on the Mount of Olives?"

Answer: The Mount of Olives, sometimes referred to as "Olivet" in the KJV (2 Samuel 15:30; Acts 1:12) or "the mount facing Jerusalem" (1 Kings 11:7), is a ridge running along the east side of Jerusalem, separated from the city walls by a ravine and the Brook Kidron. The Mount of Olives was the site of many events in the Bible and will be the site of a yet-future fulfillment of prophecy.

In the Old Testament, the Mount of Olives is mentioned once in relation to King David. When David's son Absalom wrested control of Jerusalem, David and his loyal followers fled the city via an eastern route: "David continued up the Mount of Olives, weeping as he went; his head was covered and he was barefoot. All the people with him covered their heads too and were weeping as they went up" (2Sam. 15:30). Later, King Solomon used the Mount of Olives for idol worship: "On a hill east of Jerusalem, Solomon built a high place for Chemosh the detestable god of Moab, and for Molek the detestable god of the Ammonites" (1 Kings 11:7). In one of Ezekiel's visions, the prophet sees the glory of the Lord depart from Jerusalem and come to rest "above the mountain east of it" (Ezekiel 11:23).

Jesus made many visits to the **Mount of Olives** (Luke 21:37). In fact, it was "usual" for Him to go there when in the vicinity of Jerusalem (Luke 22:39). Every time Jesus visited Lazarus and Mary and Martha, He was on the **Mount of Olives**, for their village of Bethany was situated on the eastern slope. The road from Bethany to Jerusalem lay over Olivet.

The Bible records Jesus' visiting the **Mount of Olives** three times in the last week of His earthly life, and each time something of significance happened. The first visit was to deliver what has come to be known as the Olivet Discourse, recorded in Matthew 24:1—25:46.

Parallel passages are found in Mark 13:1– 37 and Luke 21:5–36. The content of the Olivet Discourse is Jesus' response to His disciples' question "When will these things be, and what will be the sign of your coming and of the close of the age?" (Matthew 24:3). Jesus' teaching in Matthew 24–25 primarily concerns the future tribulation period and the second

coming of Christ at the end of the tribulation. The Discourse includes parables about those who wait for the Master's coming—the wise and faithful servant (Matthew 24:45–51), the five wise virgins (Matthew 25:1–13), and the good servant who uses his resources wisely (Matthew 25:14–30).

Jesus' second visit is what we call the triumphal entry. The donkey Jesus rode that day was found in the area of Bethany and Bethphage, on the east side of the **Mount of Olives** (Luke 19:29–30). Then, "when he came near the place where the road goes down the **Mount of Olives**, the whole crowd of disciples began joyfully to praise God in loud voices for all the miracles they had seen" (verse 37). While still on the **Mount of Olives**, Jesus looked at the vista in front of Him, wept over the city, and pronounced a judgment against it (verses 41–44).

Jesus' third visit during the week of His passion was on the night He was betrayed. That evening began with the Last Supper in Jerusalem and ended in the Garden of Gethsemane on the **Mount of Olives**. During that last Passover meal, Jesus washed His disciples' feet and then revealed Judas as the betrayer (John 13:1-30). At the conclusion of the meal, Jesus established the New Covenant and instituted the Lord's Supper (Matthew 26:26-29; 1 Corinthians 11:23-26). Then He took His disciples to the Garden of Gethsemane (literally, "Garden of the Oilpress") located on the western slope of the Mount of Olives. There Jesus prayed in agony as He contemplated the day to come. So overcome by the horror of what He was to experience in the crucifixion the following day that His sweat was "like drops of blood" (Luke 22:44) and God sent an angel from heaven to strengthen Him (Luke 22:43).

After Jesus prayed, Judas Iscariot arrived with a multitude of soldiers, high priests, Pharisees, and servants to arrest Jesus. Judas identified Jesus by the prearranged signal of a kiss, which he gave to Jesus. Trying to protect Jesus, Peter drew a sword and attacked a man named Malchus, the servant of the high priest, cutting off his ear. Jesus rebuked Peter and healed the man's ear, displaying the miraculous power of God (Luke 22:51). Nevertheless, the mob arrested Jesus and took Him to face trial, while the disciples scattered in fear for their lives.

After the trials, crucifixion, and resurrection, Jesus once again stood on the Mount of Olives. During His final post-resurrection appearance, Jesus led His disciples "out to the vicinity of Bethany, [and] he lifted up his hands and blessed them. While he was blessing them, he left them and was taken up into heaven. Then they worshiped him and returned to Jerusalem with great joy" (Luke 22:50-52). Acts 1:12 specifies that "the vicinity of Bethany" was indeed Mount of Olives. Immediately the following Jesus' ascension, two angels told the disciples on the Mount of Olives that "this same Jesus, who has been taken from you into heaven, will come back in the same way you have seen him go into heaven" (Acts 1:11). According to the

Mount of Olives, Continued

prophet Zechariah, Jesus will return not only in the same *way*, but to the same *place*. In a prophecy related to the end times, Zechariah declares, "On that day his feet will stand on the **Mount of Olives**, east of Jerusalem, and the **Mount of Olives** will be split in two from east to west, forming a great valley, with half of the mountain moving north and half moving south" (Zechariah 14:4). The very location where David wept in defeat and where Jesus was betrayed and rejected will be the place where Jesus returns in triumph over all His enemies.

Maps Inside

Many years ago if you wanted to get somewhere, you would ask directions from someone who knew the way. They might tell you to turn at a certain landmark, which could be a large rock, a tree, or a big red barn. All was well if you had good directions and followed them carefully. Since then, maps and compasses and GPS (global positional system) have guided us. Knowing the old way of getting directions did not necessarily help in using a new method of navigation. With a map, you need to know where you are at any time. You have to learn to read a map in order for it to be useful. It is a whole new method of finding your way. to a life of grace as expressed in the New Testament is like learning a new type of navigation. Living under the law was a lot like getting directions. If you followed them carefully, all was well. Any glitch and you could easily be lost, but with practice you might get good at it. With the advent of maps, your previous understanding does not help.

Some people think that when we say eternal life is not from the law, we are throwing our rules of conduct to the wind. Grace gives you freedom to aim at a higher target and find a way to get there. A map

or GPS can show many ways to get to a destination. Roads may be detoured for whatever reason, but a map can help you navigate back roads, so you will have no problem.

In our spiritual world, we have Jesus as head of the church. When we trust in Jesus as Lord and Savior, we receive His Holy Spirit. Jesus has a plan for us. He often reveals His plan one step at a time. He has the right to ask us to serve Him in whatever way or place He wishes. Also, He has given us the Old and New Testaments as a kind of map.

When a Pharisee asked Jesus which is the most important commandment in the Law, "Jesus said unto him, Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like unto it, Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets" (Matthew 22:37-40).

How can we say that salvation has set us free from the law? It seems we are now lawless and can do whatever we want! That alarms some folks. We are so used to the strict direction of the law that our sudden freedom frightens us. What guides us?

As believers, we are not without guidance once we are saved. Scripture says that we are dead to the written law. In fact, Jeremiah chapter 31 says, "Behold, the days come, saith the Lord, that I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel, and with the house of Judah: Not according to the covenant that I made with their fathers in the day that I took them by the hand to bring them out of the

land of Egypt; which my covenant they brake, although I was an husband unto them, saith the Lord: But this shall be the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel; After those days, saith the Lord, I will put my law in their inward parts, and write it in their hearts; and will be their God, and they shall be my people (Jeremiah 31:31-33).

That is exactly what has happened! With the Holy Spirit, we have the law of God written inside us. What drives us now comes from the heart. We have a built in moral compass and roadmap, in a manner of speaking. When you are new in the faith, it seems hard at times to understand. We may want the old way—the Law—to guide us; but Jesus has paid the price for our souls and now He is the owner. Don't be afraid to learn how it works.
